Would I know the answer?

Did I know the answer?

Last time I asked; I really would like to answer one of YOUR Questions. Please get in touch and let me find the answer for YOU.

We had a question asking what was the significance of the Past Master's jewel.


There are so many symbols, words and phrases in Freemasonry used both as part of its rituals as well as part of its vocabulary, that studying and trying to understand the 'meanings' of them is a worthwhile and rewarding journey. One such prominent symbol and phrase is the 47th problem of Euclid.

It is considered a great honour to be elected and serve as the Master of a Lodge. It shows that the individual has attained maturity, leadership, charisma and motivation, but above all the knowledge to be able to lead others. The position brings with it a completely new set of responsibilities that are often not appreciated when accepting the office. After his tenure of office many Past Masters are presented with a jewel, symbolising the appreciation of the Lodge and his dedication to it. But it also symbolises something else; that the individual has completed his journey through the different offices and positions in the Lodge to a new plain.

The 47th problem of Euclid features prominently in many Past Master's jewels. Selecting this symbol to represent one of its highest honours must mean that it is a significant part of the Craft. Yet many Freemasons do not know why it features on the jewel. Clearly it is based on geometry and all Freemasons know of the linkage. Euclid showed 465 problems so why is the 47th so important? The 47th problem is mentioned in Anderson's 'Constitutions' in 1723. It states that "The Greater Pythagoras provided Euclid's first book, which if duly observed, is the Foundation of all Masonry". It is also mentioned in the Third Degree Lecture where we

are taught to be lovers of the arts and sciences. Although Pythagoras and Euclid are acknowledged for discovering 'The Square on the hypotenuse is equal to the sum of the Squares on the other two sides of a right angles triangle', the Egyptians used the same principle for a long time before, to re-measure their fields after flooding from the Nile, which washed away their boundary markers. Builders since ancient times also used the theorem in construction. It must surely have been used in the construction of the Pyramids?

Why then the Euclid/Pythagoras symbol for the Past Master's Jewel? To prove that he has followed the teachings of Freemasonry and has indeed continued to study 'The Liberal Arts and Sciences' and hopefully will continue to do so, and encourage others to follow!

Delphis Lodge Old English Night

Delphis Lodge held its annual Old English Night on Saturday 9th April at Kyrle Street. This traditional night dates back many years. It is believed to have started off with the Brethren sitting around smoking clay pipes with bowls of Shag tobacco in the middle of the tables singing traditional songs, washed down with a barrel of beer. Anyone not smoking would be fined, how times have changed!

This traditional night is a cross between old time music hall and Last Night of the Proms. The night starts off with the parading of a baron of beef around the Lodge whilst all sing "There will always be an England", accompanied by several Brethren on comb and paper kazoos.

This year's acts included a rendition of the famous Cadburys gorilla advert featuring W Bro Ian Warren playing the drums to Phil Collins, "In the Air Tonight", a recital of Les Barker's poem "Any News of The Iceberg" and many more skits. The singing was led by W Bro Peter Watkins from Vassar-Smith Lodge. Peter has strong links to Delphis Lodge, starting off his Masonic career with them and becoming Master in 2001. The night concluded with Last Night of the Proms style renditions of Land of Hope and Glory, Jerusalem and Rule Britannia.

In the past, the Old English Night was considered the event of the year for Delphis Lodge attracting 120 Brethren, the maximum the hall can take. So much so, that each member was restricted to only one guest. Despite Covid, the event is still very popular and attracted a party of twenty-two Masons from Vassar-Smith and the Royal Forest of Dean lodges.

Fifty Year Certificate

At Palladian Lodge, the Deputy Provincial Grand Master, VW Bro Graham King presented a 50 Year Certificate to W Bro Dennis King, PPrSGW, aged 94 years.

W Bro Dennis, more commonly known as Bill, was initiated into The Lodge of Temperance and Benevolence, No 1160, meeting in London, on 10th October 1970 and remains a member to this day.

Bill became a joining member of Palladian Lodge 120 on 4th March 1976, and became Charity Steward of this Lodge from 2001 through to 2011. He was appointed to London Grand Rank in 1990 and Provincial Grand Rank of Past Provincial Grand Sword Bearer in 2007. He was further promoted to Past Provincial Senior Grand Warden in 2021.

Bill also became a member of Royal Arch Chapter, having been exalted into the Fortitude Chapter No 229 in London and became a joining member of Gloucestershire and Herefordshire Chapter of first Principals in April 2008.



Can You Help Provide Aid to Ukraine?

A request from Bro Paul Finlay Charity Steward Eastnor Lodge No 751

Eastnor Lodge was recently contacted by Mr Guy Bodger who has been organising and delivering relief aid for Ukrainian refugees.

Guy has carried out two trips so far, co-ordinated supplies, transport, and drivers to deliver two van loads of much needed food, clothing, and medical supplies to exactly where it is needed most in Romania.

Guy Bodger lives in Putley eight miles east of Hereford and has just come back from taking two van loads of food, medical supplies and toiletries to the Suceava refugee centre which is about 35 miles from the Ukrainian border in Romania.

Guy writes.

"We have delivered a collection that started at Monmouth School for Boys which was coordinated by Mark Masons Internet Lodge No 1975, Monmouthshire, who collected donations and helped us organise the transportation (in close relation with Vassar Smith Lodge, Lydney). We loaded up the vans last Friday from the Lydney Lodge and delivered everything successfully earlier this week. We were kindly supported with transport costs by the Vassar Smith Lodge."

"We are now planning another trip but this time from the Ledbury area to a charity in Moldova. As you may be aware Moldova is one of the poorest countries in Europe and is struggling to cope with the influx of refugees. The charity is based in Palanca which is in Southern Moldova, very close to Odessa in Ukraine. Guy and his fellow drivers will be making the 1500-mile journey with at least two van loads of supplies."

The cost to Guy for one vehicle is approximately £1,600, made up of fuel, ferries, and taxes.

Eastnor Lodge is supporting Guy with this incredible effort by initially donating £500. Guy is aiming to



source item donations from local aid collection centres and funding within Herefordshire.

The following supplies are urgently required:

- Canned meat and vegetables
- Pasta
- Ladies hygiene products and babies nappies
- Underwear for women and children
- Spring clothing for women and children from 1 to 14 years
- Spring shoes for children up to 14 years

And very importantly A4 printing paper (all paper came from Ukraine, therefore Moldova is facing a significant crisis on this issue). Paperwork must still be carried out. The equivalent of two pallets of paper is required.

If you are able to provide any of these products then we have arranged a time to drop them off at the Masonic Centre, Kyrle Street in Hereford. This will be open from 10am till 12 midday on Saturday 14th May.

I believe this is an incredible charitable cause, therefore if any Lodge would like to support this with donations, as not all aid collections may have exactly what is needed, or indeed grants, they will be gratefully received.

These supplies will be delivered directly to the charity in Moldova and therefore reach the refugees and support both them and the Moldavian charity directly. Unfortunately, not all aid is getting to exactly where it is needed.

Herefordshire Black and White Trail

A look at one of the many trails across our Province.

This month the Black and White Trail, a thirty-seven mile road trip around the quintessentially English Villages of North Herefordshire, linking the Masonic Centres of Leominster and Kington



- Medieval villages with the prettiest half-timbered buildings
- Quiet roads, passing hopyards, orchards and farmland
- Situated in the north of the Province
- Great to walk, bike or drive
- Visit in spring for the apple blossom, in autumn for the harvest

The Black and White Trail is a roadtrip designed to take one to two days sampling local food and drink along the way. This time of year you can see the cider orchards blossoming, the rapeseed fields glowing yellow and bluebells lining the woodlands. If you are short on time then Weobley, Pembridge and Eardisland are considered the jewels in the crown (unless you have local knowledge that suggests otherwise!)

Should you require it, there are electric charging points in Leominster's Broad Street (HR6 8DD) and Etnam Street (HR6 8AE) car parks or Kington's Mill Street car park (HR5 3DP).

The trail provides details for a number of suggested stops and also excursions further afield if time and inclination permit.

The route can be seen on the next page with details provided for the eleven way points in the downloadable route guide.



Where Am I? - Answer to Last Month's Question


Last month we asked, can you identify this well know Herefordshire Landmark?

- A church and ruined castle stand side by side.
- The castle dates back to the eleventh century but the church is even older.
- The castle was garrisoned during the English Civil War.
- The church is internationally renowned for its unique Romanesque sculpture.



The church was built around 1140. It may have replaced an earlier Saxon church at the same site, and the oval raised form of the churchyard is typical of even older Celtic foundations. Around the 6th and 7th centuries the Kilpeck (Welsh:Llanddewi Cil Peddeg) area was within the British kingdom of Eryng, which maintained Christian traditions dating back to the late Roman period.

The carvings in the local red sandstone are remarkable for their number and their fine state of preservation, particularly round the south door, the west window, and along a row of corbels which run right around the exterior of the church under the eaves. The carvings are all original and in their original positions. They have been attributed to a Herefordshire School of stonemasons, probably local but who may have been instructed by master masons recruited in France by Oliver de Merlimond. He was steward to the Lord of Wigmore, Hugh Mortimer, who went on a pilgrimage to Santiago de Compostela in Spain and, on his return, built a church with similar Romanesque carvings (now largely lost) at Shobdon, 30 miles north of Kilpeck. (Shobdon Arches can be seen as part of the Black and White Trail featured in this issue). Hugh de Kilpeck, a relative of Earl Mortimer, employed the same builders at Kilpeck, and their work is also known at Leominster, Rowlestone and elsewhere.


