Would I know the answer?

Did I know the answer?

I asked: Great Lights?

I love candles. Their warm glimmering light gives me a feeling of comfort, reassurance and safety. On a cold and dark winter's night their glow gives me a feeling of peace. Modern technology and the introduction of "health and safety" have taken away some of the magic of candles.


In our Lodges we use candles for the Master and Wardens; but why just them and what for? They are symbolic of course, but even so they do not represent the Three Great Lights in Masonry. The candle symbolises light and darkness, life and death. the beginning and the end.

The Three Great Lights in Masonry are another matter of course. The first is the Holy Bible in this country, being predominantly Christian. The practice may be and often is different in other lands. What is vital and unchangeable is that a Volume of the Sacred Law, VSL, should be open upon the Masonic altar whenever a Lodge is open. A Jewish Lodge may prefer to use the Old Testament; the Turkish or Persian would use the Koran, and the Mahammedan and Brahmins the Vedas. In fact if a Lodge has members of many races and creeds, several books may be open. Whichever book is open, all profess a belief in the Great Architect of the Universe and upon it will lie the other great lights; the Square and Compasses. Without all three no Masonic Lodge can exist, much less open for work. Together with the Warrant from the Grand Lodge they are indispensable.

Just as the VSL represents all faiths and is all inclusive, so are the symbols which lie on it. The Square is not for any one Lodge, any one nation or any one religion because in all it speaks the same tongue. The compasses circumscribe the desires of Masons wherever dispersed; the Square held between the points of the Compasses is universal. In these three we find the simple teachings of universality of brotherhood, the love of god for his people and the hope of immortality. For the Initiate, a fuller explanation of the use of a VSL being for All religions is contained in the first of the Old Charges adopted in 1723.

Strange, isn't it, that a simple, warm and comforting glow can lead me to consider its part in our Masonic

Ukrainian families split apart by conflict will be reunited thanks to support of the MCF

The Masonic Charitable Foundation have lent their support to families affected by the conflict in Ukraine by helping to raise a £100,000 donation to the British Red Cross, along with other Freemasons across England and Wales. The grant will support the Red Cross in its work with people seeking safety in the UK who have lost contact with loved ones.

After being torn apart, finding each other can be incredibly hard and many may not know whether their children, partner or parents are alive, let alone where they are. Even when family members are found, the legal process to reunite can be long and complicated, and physically reuniting them is often unaffordable. Thanks to the British Red Cross they can be safely brought together in the UK.

The British Red Cross international family tracing team helps to find missing relatives, with experienced caseworkers, supported by interpreters, finding out how people were separated and where they could be. Those looking for loved ones can also upload a photo of themselves on the Trace the Face website in the hope that their missing family recognise them. If found, they will be able to speak to each other by phone.

The Red Cross can also help families with visa applications and arrange face-to-face reunions with relatives in the UK. Dedicated caseworkers support refugees both practically and emotionally during this long process, helping them deal with the trauma of separation, and supporting them to access accommodation and financial support to maintain their wellbeing. Red Cross teams can also help pay for flights to the UK, for those that cannot afford it.

The Red Cross has been reuniting families since before World War II. Last year they brought together almost 8,000 people separated by conflict. They have a presence in 192 countries, with a vast network can help people in crisis to find missing loved ones in nearly every country in the world.

This latest £100,000 grant from the Freemasons comes after a series of previous grants totalling more than £1 million, helping Ukrainian refugees both in the UK and in Ukraine, as well as in Poland, Moldova and other neighbouring countries.

Freemasons contributed to the grant through the Masonic Charitable Foundation, which is funded by Freemasons, their families and friends, from across England and Wales.

Alex Fraser, UK Director of Refugee Support and Restoring Family Links for the British Red Cross, said:

"We're very grateful to the Freemasons for this generous grant which we'll use to reunite families torn apart by conflict. For people seeking safety in a crisis, losing contact with family members adds a new layer of trauma, and while the conflict in Ukraine has highlighted that fact, it's a situation facing countless refugees and people on the move around the globe.

"Bringing families back together is a hard and complex process, but for someone looking for their child, spouse or sibling, it means everything. The Freemasons' generosity will help us to support these people, whoever they are and whatever they've been through."

The First Aeroplane in Herefordshire?

Was this the first aeroplane to be seen in Hereford? Article by Andrew Moore

It is hard to believe in the current climate of international travel and the internet that it was only 120 years ago that the Wright Brothers made their historical flight in Flyer 1. This was the first ever, heavier than air powered and controlled flight. Flyer 1 was a biplane with a front elevator and rear rudder and marked the beginning of the pioneer era of aviation.

Aeroplane design evolved rapidly and by 1908 the Daily Mail offered a prize of £500 for the first flight across the English Channel.


With no serious attempt being made the offer was renewed for 1909 and the prize money doubled to £1,000. Many commented that this was simply a publicity stunt by the newspaper with the Paris newspaper Le Matin commenting that there was no chance of the prize being won.

There were however three contenders. The successful crossing was made by Louis Bleriot in July 1909 in a time of thirty six minutes and thirty seconds. He was hailed a hero and made several appearances at various aviation events.

Bleriot developed his own design of aircraft for the crossing. On successful completion' he also picked up orders for over 100 of his Type XI aircraft, each selling for 10,000 francs. This type of aircraft has a special link with Herefordshire as we shall see.

Aviation was still in its infancy and so in 1912 the Daily Mail sponsored six aviators to conduct a series of exhibition flights around the UK. It was known as the "Wake Up England' tour.

Both the French aviator Henri Salmet and the British aviator Claude Graham-White embarked on an extensive tour of the UK. Henri Salmet used his Bleriot XI-2 aircraft during the tour. It was a two seater aircraft enabling him to take a (very brave!) fee-paying passenger.

The design was based on the single seater version used by Bleriot for his successful Channel crossing some three years previously.

The 1912 tour by Henri Salmet included stops at Ross on Wye and Hereford. Ross on Wye would seem a strange place to stop for a nationwide tour but in 1912 it was a major staging post for transport between London and South Wales, a route which later became the A40. This would have made navigation easier between Cardiff and Ross on Wye by following the ground based route from the air.

Originally Salmet had intended to fly from Cardiff directly to Ross on Wye but he diverted to Raglan and left his machine there overnight, resuming his trip the following day.


He landed on the Golf Links in Ross on Wye, at the foot of Penyard Hill, to the rapturous applause of a huge crowd. The crowd rushed to inspect the machine and Samet gave a short speech. Due to adverse weather the plane was covered and guarded overnight by the local police and boy scouts.

The following day the weather cleared and M Salmet showed "perfect mastery of his machine flying over the heads of the crowd, turning and volplaning (diving) with the greatest ease, much to the excitement and enjoyment of the spectators".

Later that day he took off for Hereford and reached there in a quarter of an hour. He flew over the grandstand and round the course several times before landing.

He was met by the Mayor and prominent members of the city and county, together with swarming spectators with scenes of great enthusiasm, waving hats and handkerchiefs.

An hour later he provided another flying display. The following day he continued his tour by flying on to Worcester breaking his journey at Broadheath due to storms.

I will leave you with this quote from a newspaper of the day.

"To the casual observer the machine looks quite simple and judging by the comparative ease with which M Salmet managed it and worked and guided it in almost any direction, irrespective of the wind, there is every possibility of the flying machine becoming vastly more popular and in greater demand in the near future."

Inventing the Future

An Especial Meeting to celebrate the tercentenary of the 1723 Constitutions



A number of Herefordshire Masons joined more than 1,600 attending the Especial Meeting of Grand Lodge on 31st January, including Grand Masters and representatives from American and European Grand Lodges, and the Grand Masters of the Order of Women Freemasons and HFAF – Freemasonry for Women.

The programme – titled The 1723 Constitutions: Inventing the Future – included talks from Dr Ric Berman and Akram Elias, the Prestonian Lecturer for 2023 and former GM of the Grand Lodge of Washington DC, together with a film produced by Matthew Mitchell and narrated by David Jacobi.

It was, in the words of the Pro Grand Master, Jonathan Spence, a truly extraordinary and wonderful event.

The Constitutions gave Freemasonry a proclamation of values which became an important ingredient in transmitting the principles of enlightenment, confidently propagating notions of religious tolerance, meritocracy, self-improvement by education and even democratic elections.

Over time, these ideas were widely embraced as they spread across Europe and in America, shaping models of governance.

The 1723 Constitutions Frontispiece.

Beautifully engraved by John Pine, the frontispiece to the 1723 Constitutions offers an image of John Montagu, 2nd Duke of Montagu, Grand Master in 1721, presenting the Constitutional Scroll and a set of compasses to Philip, Duke of Wharton, his successor. Each is attended by his respective Grand Officers. Dressed in clerical vestments, Dr Jean Theophilus Desaguliers is placed on the far right.

In the central background framed by two rows of columns is an image of the parting of the Red Sea. Referencing the flight of the Israelites from Egypt and their journey across the Sinai Desert to the Promised Land, the image symbolises redemption and 'obtaining possession'. The pillars display the five orders of architecture: Doric, Ionic, Corinthian, Tuscan, and Composite. They might also allude to the five monarchs who supported Wren's reconstruction of St Paul's Cathedral (1675-1708): Charles II, James II, William & Mary, and Queen Anne.

In the immediate foreground, between the two Grand Masters, is a representation of Euclid's 47th proposition: a right-angled triangle with the square on the side opposite the right angle equal to the sum of the squares on the other two sides. The symbol is associated with architecture and worn by a Past Master of a Masonic Lodge. Underneath is the Greek word Eureka, a reference to Archimedes' exclamation 'I have found it'. The word is related to 'heuristic' and describes experience and observation-based techniques for learning and problem-solving.

Apollo, the son of Zeus, a god in both Greek and Roman mythology, is drawn in the sky at the reins of a chariot: an allegorical representation of the sun approaching its meridian. Apollo was the god of healing, music and poetry, the leader of the Muses and the patron deity of Delphi. The intention is to impress upon the viewer a sense of philosophical, scientific and spiritual well-being, and to imply divine approval.

For those of you that saw the video first hand at the Especial Meeting or have watched it on <u>YouTube</u> you will recognise many of the characters and symbols described in the video.



More information on Masonic frontispieces is available in Martin Cherry's paper: <u>'The Frontispieces of the Book of Constitutions</u>, 1723-1819'.

Martin, the Librarian at the Museum of Freemasonry in London, offers a personal take, as does Chris Powell in his paper on a 1723 engraving of the List of Lodges by Pine, released within a few weeks of the publication of the 1723 Constitutions.

The paper, 'Pine's List of Lodges', is from 'Notes & Queries', AQC 131.

Following on from our article "Herefordshire Before the Union of 1813" W Bro John Eisel sent in the following update.

Dear Sir

May I be allowed a little space to correct a minor misinterpretation in the details of early Lodges in Herefordshire, printed in the current edition of The Craftsmen (No. 76)?

It is stated there that there was a Palladian Lodge No. 290 in Hereford in 1755, which is certainly incorrect. The 1755 printed list of Lodges, which gives the position in June 1755, shows that the highest number at that time was 269. Subsequent to that a renumbering of Lodges took place, closing up the numbering by removing defunct Lodges from the list, and when the next printed list was published, taking the position up to 26 February 1756, the numbering only went up to 212. It would take some primary research to discover whether this renumbering took place in 1755, as subsequently used in Lane's Masonic Records 1717-1894, or very early in 1756.

There is an on-line searchable version of Lane's Masonic Records: it is also possible to view a scanned copy of the original book on line, and I have used a copy of the second edition (1895) in compiling this

note. In this the details of the Lodges are given, listed under the numbering in use at that time, in the case of Palladian being 120. For each Lodge there is a listing of the numbers under the various renumberings that took place, beginning with a column headed 1755, then 1770, 1780 etc. This does not mean that Palladian Lodge was numbered 290 in 1755, only that it was numbered 290 under the 1755 numbering system. In fact 290 is consistent with the known date of the warrant (12 October 1762).

Lane also states that the Lodge was not called Palladian until 1767, and there is no reason to doubt this: unfortunately I can't confirm it as the earliest minute books, covering 1762 to 1778, are missing, and have been for the best part of 200 years!).



For this month, can you identify this well known Herefordshire landmark?



This castle was built in the 1180s by the Norman Lord Walter de Lacy inside a rectangular enclosure which may date back to the Roman occupation of Britain.

Fortified during the 12th century, the rectangular enclosure was bisected by another earthen wall, forming the two outer baileys of the castle which sat side-by-side to the south of the motte. In addition, a twintowered gatehouse, protected with a portcullis, was added to the new outer curtain which enclosed the rectangular area. The gatehouse still exists, though extensively ruined.
