

Lasked: Different Rituals?

Over the years I have often enjoyed the differences and nuances of Lodge Ritual. So many Lodges now use Emulation working and use it as their standard, but the slight differences keep us attentive to enjoy the meanings and meetings.

Recently I came upon the "Universal" Closing, and I copy it below for those who feel that, on occasions, they would like something new. It is full of meaning, especially at the moment, and contains the principles that I hold dear.



"You are now about to guit this safe retreat of peace and friendship, and to mix again with the busy world; amidst all its cares and employments, forget not those sacred duties which have been so frequently inculcated, and so strongly recommended in this Lodge; be ye therefore discreet, prudent and temperate, remember that at this pedestal you have solemnly and voluntarily vowed to relieve and befriend with unhesitating cordiality every Brother who might need your assistance; that you have promised to remind him in the most gentle manner of his failings, and to aid and vindicate his character whenever wrongfully traduced; to suggest the most candid, the most palliating, and the most favourable circumstances, even when his conduct is justly liable to reprehension and blame; thus shall the world see how dearly Freemasons love each other. But, my brethren, you are expected to extend these noble and generous sentiments still further; let me impress upon your minds, and may it be instilled in your hearts, that every human creature has a just claim on your kind offices; I therefore trust that you will be good to all, more particularly do I recommend to your care the household of the faithful, that by diligence and fidelity in the duties of your respective vocation, liberal beneficence and diffusive charity, by constancy and sincerity in your friendships, a uniformly kind, just, amiable and virtuous deportment, prove to the world the happy and beneficial effects of our ancient and honourable Institution. Let it not be said that you have laboured in vain nor wasted your strength for nought - for your word is before the Lord, and your recompense is with God. Finally, brethren, be of one mind, live in peace, and may the God of love and mercy delight to dwell amongst you, and bless you for evermore. Nothing now remains but, according to ancient custom, etc., etc.,...."

This may appear to be rather extended, but on the occasions of a shorter meeting, it could be a valuable and interesting addition.

Who Cares for the Carers?





Herefordshire Carers

There are estimated to be 60,000 unpaid carers in Herefordshire looking after friends, neighbours and loved ones. It is a sad fact that 80% of carers in the UK become mentally or physically ill as a direct result of their caring role.

Who can they reach out to for support when they need it and who looks after the carers? Herefordshire Carers is a local charity which compliments the commissioned service CarerLinks by providing support to carers and raising awareness of the work that they do. The service is provided free of charge and is crucial in reducing the chances of carers needing intervention by other services or to help prevent them from becoming one of the 80%.

Herefordshire Carers have local groups across the county including special interest groups such as gardening and craft groups. They organise a wide range of events to reduce isolation, improve wellbeing, and develop opportunities for peer support and to raise awareness of these hidden carers.

Over the past three years the service has become crucial to unpaid carers in Herefordshire, providing events, activities, support, respite and counselling to support their mental health and wellbeing. In 2021 two new groups were set up following funding from Herefordshire Freemasons. This enabled the services to be offered to a wider catchment area and provide assistance in these two new locations. The funds have also been used to provide several wellbeing groups held in heritage woodland. These groups provided the carers with new skills that will help them to build resilience.

Georgia Prince Service Co-Ordinator for Herefordshire Carers comments.

"The donation from Herefordshire Freemasons enabled us to continue our service in Herefordshire. We rely solely on donations of which we need over £40,000 per year to continue. Without the help we have received from donations we would be unable to continue the work we do. Our service has become vital for carers who frequently refer to us as a lifeline for them. We are passionate about assisting carers to continue in their caring role, by offering a place to have time to themselves and meeting others in similar situations, reducing the social isolation that often occurs as a result of being a Carer".

Carers Week 2023

Carers Week is an annual campaign to raise awareness of caring, highlighting the challenges unpaid carers face and to recognise the contribution they make to families and communities throughout the UK. It also helps people who don't think of themselves as having caring responsibilities to identify as carers and access much-needed support.

As part of the celebrations, an art project has been unveiled at The Courtyard. This project consists of various panels created by carers across the county. They have been sewn together to create one large wall hanging. Each panel has been created by hand, the majority of which have been hand embroidered.

The art project was unveiled at the Courtyard on 5th June as the start of a series of events to mark Carers Week. The art work will be displayed in the Courtyard for the whole of Carers Week and will then be displayed at various locations across Herefordshire for the next 12 months.

Meet The New

This month we meet W Bro Paul Cooper the Provincial Grand Sword Bearer.





You will have seen Paul at the Provincial Grand Lodge and also the Cathedral Service carrying the Sword at the head of the procession. However Paul is more at home, outdoors in his native environment taking pictures of wildlife and in particular macro images of the wilder side of Herefordshire.

He tells the story of his background in his own words.

I joined the military at 16 as a boy soldier, serving for over 26 years, mostly Para Engineers and SAS. I always liked photography as long as I can remember and bought a Bronica ETRS whilst in the military and used it to develop my own slides at home.

There was one success selling a print to Athena (that high-street shop that only people of a certain age will remember). This was reproduced as a mini-poster. Then I got married to Yasmin just as I came on SAS selection and at roughly the same time we had baby Amy. So, with money being tight, the Bronica ETRS had to go. During my time in the SAS, I didn't really have time to

do a lot of photography but did spend a lot of time in the darkroom. When deployed in Ireland for a year I used the IR film that was supposed to be for photographing weapons hides etc for making black and white IR photos of castles and scenery up the Antrim Coast.

On leaving the Army I went straight onto the security circuit working with a team of all ex-SAS guys in Slovakia and Serbia, both beautiful areas of Europe. This is where my love of photography was to re-ignite, and I could also afford some lovely

Canon cameras. I quickly realised that I needed to learn how to use the fancy equipment I had so did a few workshops with a professional photographer in Derbyshire, who became a friend, and I later went on a couple of trips to Nepal with him. Having worked out how to use my cameras and lenses, I did have some minor success in The Bird Photographer of the Year competition, International Garden Photographer of the Year, Amateur Photography competition, WEX online competition and others, along with lots of publications in magazines and on websites.





The security contract I was on in Slovakia came to an end and I decided to take some time out as I had not had a Christmas and New Year off together for over 10 years. During this period of unemployment. I started volunteering with Herefordshire Wildlife Trust as a volunteer photographer. As my chosen subjects are the natural world, landscape, wildlife and macro photography of insects, I really enjoyed my time with HWT and a lot of my photos were published on their advertising banners, posters, and flyers. Unfortunately, I had to go back to work at some time and now work for Safeguard Medical as a Dispatch Supervisor in their warehouse, which means I do not have the time to support HWT as I used to.

However, one day last year in Queenwood, whilst trying to get a shot of a butterfly, I met Richard Bavin, the resident Artist with the Wildlife Trust. He talked about the 'Wilder Hereford' project and said that he would mention me to Marion who runs the Apple Store Gallery in Hereford. Marion,

surprisingly, knew my work and name from HWT and I was invited to join the project.

Due to work commitments, I have not been able to help on many of the restoration and conservation projects but have been able to offer support with my photography. As the project covers the Yazor Brook through Hereford and areas like the Lugg Flats, I was able to take photographs on my way to work and at weekends as all locations are local. We are now coming to the end of the project and getting ready for exhibitions and events.












Mission Accomplished

We catch up with Bro lan Pritchard of Eastnor Lodge on completing his 100 burpees for 100 days challenge.

At the time of going to press lan had raised £1,735 - what a magnificent effort!

lan writes:

"It was definitely a great challenge for me to complete and I was amazed at how much support I received. Once the donations reached my first milestone of £500 we increased the target which gave me the legs to go further.

I kept motivated by having a Teddy with me when I did each set of 100 burpees. Also recording each session and posting it on social media gave me the accountability that I had to do them.

I hurt my back on about week three which wasn't good. On the fourth attempt following my injury I managed five and had to stop. I tried an hour later and only got to two. My wife said I should just have the night off them and start again the next day. But then that wouldn't be 100 burpees a day for a hundred days. So I gave it two hours, put a belt on as tight as I could, gritted my teeth and somehow counted to 100.

I also received some great comments on Just Giving and Facebook which kept me going.

I would love to thank everyone for their support and very generous donations. It's certainly going to go a long way for purchasing Teddies.

I shall be meeting back up with Mike Hopkins as I'd love to be part of the Teddies team now and continue with him linking up with various emergency services to provide them with Teddies.

If anyone has any crazy fund raising ideas and wants a willing participant just give me a call.

Chris Neave Memorial Challenge Paddle - Cycle - Climb 17 - 23 Sep 2023



The Challenge

On the 22nd of September 2022 my younger brother passed away after a long battle with poor health. He spoke often about conducting adventures in Scotland if he was of good health.

To that end Carl D and I will attempt the first Caledonian Adventure Triathlon:

Paddle from Fort William, on the West Coast of Scotland, to Fort Augustus at the start of Loch Ness. This will take 2 days and cover 52km.

Cycle from Fort Augustus around Loch Ness via Inverness on the East Coast. This will take 2+ days and will cover 120km both on and off road.

Climb Ben Nevis which will take 1 day and climb over 1300m for a distance of 17km.

All of this will be conducted fully self supported with wild camping.


