

Would I know the answer?

Did I know the answer?

By W Bro Dennis W. Roberts, PAGDC This month I asked: In plain sight; What do I see?

Sometimes we all take things for granted and do not examine and ask what it is that we see, and why. For me, a real example of this is the Provincial Banner. It is always on show for the Provincial meeting, and permanently displayed in the Hereford temple. But it has meaning and reasons for its various parts, which few of us even question. All Provinces have a banner and each is peculiar to them, but nevertheless linked to Grand Lodge.

In the centre is the arms of Grand Lodge which are an amalgamation of those used by the Moderns in 1717 and the Ancients in 1750, which were then merged in 1813.

This banner is, of course, not the first for Herefordshire. The first was provided in 1817 by the Provincial Grand Master, RW Bro Richard Scudamore, but there is no trace



of it today. A second banner was presented in November 1880 by the newly installed PGM, RW Bro Sir Joseph Russell Bailey, afterwards Lord Glanusk. This framed banner is in the dining room in Hereford and has an explanation of its history; well worth a read. The third banner was commissioned by Provincial Grand Lodge and presented in the Province on 6th May 1994, and hangs in the Lodge Room in Kyrle Street.

In the top left are the arms of the Scudamore family showing three stirrups leathered and buckled, surmounted by a ducal crown and 'bears paw'. Top centre are the Square and Compasses enclosed in a laurel wreath of honour. Top right is the arms of the City of Hereford showing three lions passant guardant holding erect a sword in the Dexter paw.

The Centre Shield is supported by two cherubims and comprises three castles and a chevron on which is an open set of compasses, and on the right a lion, an ox, a man and an eagle, symbols which will be familiar to those who are members of the Holy Royal Arch. The shield is surmounted by The Ark of the Covenant. The motto, 'Audi, Vide, Tace' translates as ' Listen, See, Be Silent'.

On the bottom left is the Sun (to rule the day), bottom right is the Moon (to govern the night), both being messengers of His will and His law in concord. The emblem at bottom centre is of the Royal Arch Chapter, comprising a double triangle (the Seal of Solomon), with the letter G in the centre. A fuller explanation of this emblem can, of course, be learned by becoming a member of the Holy Royal Arch Chapter; much encouraged by our leaders today.

Again, I am indebted to the work of WBro Alwyn Williams' book 'A History of Craft Freemasonry in Herefordshire', for dates and other details. Perhaps it is now time to look again in detail at your own Lodge banner and discover the thinking behind those who first designed it?

If you have not visited the 'Solomon' site lately, you should. There are now Videos, Podcasts and Webinars available for more in depth explanations. Facebook and Twitter also offer links for more information.

There is also a new link to Royal Arch Chapter, which is worth a look.

Anthony was initiated on 17th January 1974 and has enjoyed a long and distinguished masonic career seeing him be a founder of three Lodges and take the Chair of Cantilupe lodge in 1997. His Masonic career spanned the Provinces of Herefordshire, Northamptonshire and Huntingdonshire and Warwickshire.

Around forty people enjoyed the joint Teme and Arrow Lodge Ladies Festival held at the Cider Barn in Pembridge on Saturday 3rd February.





Providing Freedom from the effects of Trauma

Bro Gareth Evans talks about his own life journey and how Freemasonry has helped many on the road to recovery.

"Freemasonry is an amazing and beautiful organisation that provides people with purpose, direction, companionship and hope."

Bro Gareth Evans is the current Senior Warden of Delphis Lodge No 7769 and hoping to progress to the chair in October this year.

Born in Leominster, Gareth now lives in Essex with his wife and children. Despite coming from a military background, with postings away from Herefordshire, he has only missed three meetings since being initiated in 2017 and these were for family rather than logistical reasons.

Gareth says,

"I travelled from Northern Ireland for all my Degrees. I currently live in Essex but commute to Hereford once a month to visit family and attend Masonic meetings".

"I previously served 20 years in the British Army, including 15 years with the Royal Scots Dragoon where I was deployed constantly to both Iraq and Afghanistan".

"I lost friends and colleagues in various kinetic engagements and, subsequently, I was diagnosed with PTSD".

"I have always taken a keen interest in helping people and in 2016 I decided to transfer to the Army Welfare Service (AWS) where I spent 5 years helping soldiers and their dependants through bereavement, anxiety, couples therapy and anger management".



"I spent years analysing my own trauma and I overcame PTSD by a method I came to teach myself."

"In 2020 I decided to become self-employed in the field of mental health, as I was able to reflect on my own traumatic background and harness my in-depth knowledge taught to me by the AWS and an effective form of trauma recovery called Rapid Transformational Therapy (RTT)".

Gareth left the army in 2021 and has used his background, together with retraining as a hypnotherapist, to dedicate his life to helping people and forming a rapid therapeutic coaching company called 'Remaster Your Mind'. Gareth says,

"I strongly believe in using one's voice to uplift people rather than bring them down. I have the privilege to go beyond using just my voice. Using my training I can engage with the subconscious and help people understand the reasons behind their struggles".

He has treated many people suffering from a range of emotional issues including PTSD. Some of Gareth's clients have been ex-military and he has devised a Theta programme, a six week hypnotherapy strategy tailored to individuals to help overcome long-standing emotional issues. These have included C_PTSD, Depression, Bipolar, Chronic Back Pain and MS. His clients have experienced huge improvements in their lives as a result. Gareth puts some of his success down to Freemasonry.


He says,

"One of the two pillars of PTSD is depression, and one of the four pillars of depression is isolation. I've observed that when many Masons retire from their professional jobs, they often turn to Freemasonry as a crutch to avoid slipping into the abyss of isolation and depression. This crutch then becomes a way of life. Freemasonry is an amazing and beautiful organisation that provides people with purpose, direction, companionship, and hope."

Gareth has produced a book entitled 'My Mental Health Journal' which has a five star rating from readers.

RUM JARS

Bro Andy Taylor of Eastnor Lodge delves into the archives of the Herefordshire Regiment Museum

I am sure many readers will have seen stone jars bearing the letters SRD and, perhaps, wondered what they were!

These are Army rum jars, sometimes caller 'jordies'. It was the practice in the Army to issue soldiers with a tot of rum in arduous conditions. During the First World War this issue was widespread and certainly well received in the trenches. The issue played several roles:

- Providing warmth (and cheer) in cold and damp trenches probably its most frequent use.
- As a nerve settler less often than one might suppose
- As a reward, often for arduous or dangerous work (including trench raids and attacks) - sometimes in copious amounts resulting in drunkenness.
- Used externally as a Trench Foot preventer quite a rare event as most preferred to apply it internally!
- As a pain killer

The ration was supposed to be two tablespoons per soldier but was often more and some men did not take their issue and often units were under strength but full rations were drawn/issued.

We are all aware of the danger of excess of alcohol, and whilst modest amounts can provide a boost, in excess it can exacerbate exposure symptoms and give false warmth and a loss of reality; this happened to the troops, including the Herefordshire Regiment, at Suvla Bay. They were evacuated from the trenches after 4 days of continual rain, snow and freezing conditions, and were much debilitated when they came across dumped rations including full rum jars. Many soldiers drank to excess and curled up to sleep and in the morning were found dead – literally frozen stiff.

The initials SRD were a mystery to many soldiers! Even officially it is not entirely certain what it stood for – the most accepted version is 'Service Resupply Depot' but also quoted are 'Service Rum Diluted' and 'Services Rum Department'.

The soldier however interpreted them differently: 'Soldiers

Rum Jars – one gallon and half gallon – the half gallon was sometimes known as the officers' jar.

Run Dry', 'Soon Runs Out' and probably the most favoured 'Seldom Reaches Destination'!

It was generally the Sergeant Major's job to dole out the rum and trench songs were created around this:

If you want to find the sergeant-major, I know where he is, He's boozing up the privates' rum

One soldier remarked (rather poetically!):

And then there's rum. Rum of course is our chief great good. The Ark of the Covenant was never borne with greater care than is bestowed upon the large stone rum-jars in their passage through this wilderness. The popularity of rum increases, till the hour when it is served tends to become a moment of religious worship. After the divine pattern, its celebration is administered by priests in the presence of higher dignitaries. When these priests happen to be old-time N.C.O.s, they want watching, or the communicants are apt to go short, to the degradation of the priests.

Sometime soldiers not used to drink over-indulged:

Although not an habitual drinker I enjoyed my Rum ration. On one occasion our corporal had managed to pinch a Jordy of Rum, swapping a Jordy of Lime Fruit Juice. A generous helping out of this Rum Jordy put me out of gear for nearly two days. They hid me in a dugout and covered me with sandbags till I came round."



However the general opinion was that the Rum ration in moderation was a good thing; certainly there were many soldiers that welcomed it and any attempt to withdraw it would have a serious impact on morale. One division did replace the rum ration with hot soup – but it was seldom hot when it was issued and was generally not well received!

The Times in 1916 reported that the import of foreign spirits had increased to 929,000 gallons, almost entirely accounted for by the rum issued by military authorities.

Afternote:

The Royal Navy tot was stopped in 1970 but can be authorized for exceptional circumstances. The Army still issued rum in the Second World war and Korea and there are accounts of rum being carried by LRDG/SAS patrols in North Africa.

Rum can still be issued to the Army, but only under exceptional circumstances and then only on the authority of a Medical Officer. In 33 years service I have only known it be issued once and then the authorizing officer had to justify his decision to the Brigadier and if I remember correctly he had to replace the issue at his own cost!

Colonel Andy Taylor is a member of Eastnor Lodge and the Honorary Curator of The Herefordshire Light Infantry Museum. He has been researching the Regiment for 40 years and his grandfather served in the Regiment during the First World War, his father served in the Herefordshire Regiment Home Guard in Ledbury in World War II and he was first Commissioned into the Herefordshire Light Infantry Cadet Battalion.

Herefordshire Strategy Update



Since the launch of the UGLE Strategy in 2023, Herefordshire Province has been building on our existing heritage, foundations and strengths to find new ways to adapt.

As a Province we already had a number of good practices in place. The Membership Team have built on these by developing a number of templates and best practice examples to help Lodges individually improve their own ways of working. These are available on the Members' Portal.

One of the key strategic pillars is to have a **'Thriving Membership'**. 2023 saw Herefordshire deliver an overall growth in membership of 1.8% with most Lodges seeing a steady growth of members. This was coupled with working to improve engagement with existing members and ensure shared succession plans are in place so that members can better plan their roles into the future. It is critical that we engage with all members, listen to their views and adapt to our collective changing needs.

On delivering a 'Coherent Organisation', the comms team have updated the public and members website to ensure we have a consistent message echoed in the material we use. There is also a Provincial Engagement or Outreach Kit which consists of a branded gazebo, pop up banners, posters brochures and business cards which can be used by Lodges at local fetes etc. It was used several times last year to raise awareness and we hope that more Lodges will look for opportunities to use it to engage the wider public. This will soon be available to book through the Members' Website with a calendar of events and booking system.

As for 'Community Engagement' and Service, this has always been a strength within the Province and 2023 was no exception. We celebrated our first Charity Evening held at Kyrle Street with over one hundred charity representatives, Lodge members and invited guests. It was a very successful event showcasing the support we give to our local community in Herefordshire and helped to raise our profile via social media and press coverage.













Lodges have continued to support local charities with both money and equally importantly time. This has included working with foodbanks, local community transport and clearing churchyards! This great work reinforces our core values of Integrity, Friendship, Respect and Service.

We need to continue our journey and build on the great work across all three pillars to ensure we achieve our long term goals and ensure the future of Freemasonry in Herefordshire.

Charity Updates



TalentAid

The MCF Talent Aid Scheme

Talent Aid helps the children and grandchildren of Freemasons who are exceptionally talented in music, sport or the performing arts. Grants can be awarded to assist with ongoing costs such as sports coaching, advanced music lessons and the purchase of oneoff items such as a musical instrument or sports equipment.

Support is agreed for a set period of time and subject to both an annual financial review and confirmation that the candidate's talent continues to develop. The scheme is competitive and has limited funds.

Eligibility

All applications are subject to the following criteria:

- The candidate must be the child, step-child or grandchild of a Freemason. (Please be aware that if the Freemason's membership is not active there is a set period of time after the membership ended in which an application can be submitted. Please contact us for further information before submitting an application).
- The candidate must be aged 25 or under and in full-time education.
- A financial assessment of the family's household income.
- Candidates must apply for all other sources of available funding such as grants, scholarships and sponsorship.
- Candidates must intend to pursue their talent as a career and must be able to demonstrate exceptional talent by passing recognised examinations, gaining entry to highly competitive schemes or by performing at regional and national levels.
- Grants are not available to fund a hobby or so that an academically gifted child can attend a better school.
- Assistance with school fees for performing arts students can only be considered if they attend a Dance and Drama Award (DaDA) accredited or Music and Dance Scheme (MDS) accredited establishment, see the DaDA list and MDS list.
- We are only able to consider assistance with school fees for other disciplines if the

applicant attends a choir school, a specialist music school or a sports college based on their exceptional talent.

Please note: you are not required to have an offer of a place at your proposed school, college or university in order to apply for the TalentAid scheme. In most cases where grants toward fees are agreed, parents will be expected to make a contribution.

Application Process

The scheme is competitive and has limited funds. All TalentAid applications for each upcoming academic year will be considered the preceding July and you will be notified of the outcome of your application in August.

For those seeking support for the 2023/24 academic year: The TalentAid scheme has closed for this academic year, so we are not accepting any further applications.

For those seeking support for the 2024/25 academic year: Applications are now being accepted.

How to Apply

There are three parts to the application:

- 1 Application Form
- 2 Supporting Statement
- 3 Tutor/Coach Reference Form

The Tutor/Coach Reference Form and Supporting Statement must be completed for an application to be considered. These forms are used to help us identify the very best candidates. We will not accept alternative documents in place of any of the three TalentAid forms. The Tutor/Coach Reference Form will be emailed directly to the nominated tutor/coach once your Application Form is received.

If we do not receive all three parts of the application, together with supporting financial documents, your application will not be progressed.

The deadline for completed applications (comprising Application form, Supporting Statement and supporting documents) is 9am Monday 1stApril 2024. Any application received after this date will not be considered.


