Some months ago a brother from Staffordshire asked me to look for his grandfather's name on an Honours Board in Herefordshire, since he believed that he had been through a Chair here. It turns out that this was indeed true and the Chair was Vitruvian. His name is indeed on the Honours Board. Success! A wonderful record for the brother whom I hope to invite one day soon to see his ancestor recorded for posterity.

It led me to think of all of the centres I have visited, and of the times when I had a few moments to share those records. The records in Cheltenham, for instance, go back for centuries, and are decorated beautifully, covering the walls of the Temple. The present Brethren continue to complete the lists, and long may it continue, for just as the Secretary should give a full record of proceedings for each meeting, so the boards record the service of the leaders at the time.

All too often we pass these boards without giving a thought. The Masonic Centre in King's Heath displays their records in the entrance hall, much the same as Hereford, and we are so busy greeting our fellows, or just mentally preparing for what we have to do at the meeting, that we just pass them by. But, just give them a moment, and the memories of friendship, happiness and perhaps of sadness, will come flooding back. Some were great leaders and examples to us all; others less so, but all had their place.

The style, materials and decoration reflect the pride of the members too. Some are simple boards with painted details; others are beautifully crafted from wood with mouldings and reflecting styles of architecture. Pure gold lettering, many hand painted, in different scripts give a variance and interest to the viewer.

The loss of meetings during the pandemic and since, has led some centres to neglect the upkeep of the boards, and on a recent visit, I will not say where, I was disappointed to see that records appear to have ceased since 2016! Time perhaps for a little 'housekeeping'!

Community Engagement

Freemasons in Herefordshire play an important role in helping the local community dedicating both their time and resources to make a tangible difference to various good causes within the local area.

Two recent examples were Loyal Hay Lodge donating £1,300 to the local Dial-a-Ride in Hay on Wye to support the community transport charity and Vitruvian Lodge in Ross on Wye donating £500 to the Royal British Legion to help fund the conversion of trikes for use by veterans with physical challenges.

scheduled train broke down and the Brethren had to board an alternative to Paddington.

Following the event, the Provincial Grand Master commented via Twitter, "Thank you Brethren for your support and company today at a most nostalgic and memorable Quarterly Communication of <u>@UGLE_GrandLodge</u>, which further enhanced the indissoluble link with <u>@GrandChapter</u>".

An extract from the Pro Grand Master's address at Quarterly Communication.

Brethren, I have two announcements to make following on from what I have just said about the progress in implementing the Strategy and the steps we are taking to give real effect to the idea of "One journey, one organisation."

First, after nine years in office as Second Grand Principal, ME Companion Russell Race will retire at the Annual Investiture Meeting of the Supreme Grand Chapter. Companion Race has served at the highest levels within London and Supreme Grand Chapter and Grand Lodge for the last twenty years and we owe him a significant debt of gratitude for all that he has done in that time. I shall have an opportunity to say rather more about this at the investiture meeting in April.

In order to emphasise tangibly the commitment of the Rulers to the importance of the Strategy for the Craft and Royal Arch, working seamlessly together at all levels and giving clear support to the concept of "One journey, one organisation", I am very pleased to announce the MW The Grand Master, in his capacity as First Grand Principal, has appointed ME Companion Sir David Wootton to be Second Grand Principal. Companion Wootton will bring his considerable leadership talents and skills to bear in supporting the Royal Arch and Craft, working in tandem and ensuring proper effect is given to the Strategy overall and in particular its delivery for the Royal Arch. Companion Wootton will be installed at the Annual Investiture of Supreme Grand Chapter in April.

To succeed RW Brother Wootton as Deputy Grand Master, I am delighted to announce the MW The Grand Master has appointed RW Brother Sir Michael Snyder to that office. As you have already heard, Brother Snyder will retire as Metropolitan Grand Master on 17th April and he will be installed as Deputy Grand Master at the Craft Annual Investiture meeting on 24th April.

Brother Wootton will continue to lead, and will complete, the Third Pillar Review of our engagement with our communities, of which he is Chairman, and which will report before Christmas.

Brethren, I am delighted to announce that the MW The Grand Master has appointed RW Bro Warren Duke, PJGW, as Metropolitan Grand Master for, and Metropolitan Grand Superintendent in and over, London, with effect from 18 April 2024, in succession to RW Bro Sir Michael Snyder, who will retire on 17 April 2024. Bro Duke will be installed on a date to be arranged.

Masonic Firing Glasses

W Bro Geoff Wilding - Royal Edward Lodge No 892

It was a rest weekend in the Six Nations rugby tournament and so we had our usual Sunday viewing staple, the Antiques Road Show on as the backdrop to the evening, when I noticed the camera cut to the show's glass expert, Andy McConnell, who was stood in bright sunshine by a pedestal on which were displayed two ornate Masonic firing glasses.

As usually happens, Andy asked the owner how they had come by them, and they replied that they had bought them in an online auction. Andy then asked if they minded saying how much they had paid for them, and was told that after a low opening bid, and in a contest with a another determined bidder, their securing bid was close to £6,000.

I thought, "Good luck with that, then."

However, Andy proceeded to explain that the firing glasses had been created in the mid to late 1700's by the famous William Beilby, who is thought to be the first person to successfully produce highly decorative enamelling on glass, and who went on to produce spectacular pieces of commemorative glassware, some of which are to be found in all the great museums around the world. He said that they would have cost a lot of money when made and that even if damaged pieces come on to the market today, they can be worth many thousands of pounds.

Andy ended the piece by saying that the British Museum had recently paid £12,000 for a set of similar glasses, and other sets had been sold reaching figures of £8,000 and £6,000. So, in his opinion, if the glasses on the plinth were sold at auction today, they could easily fetch a sum of £16,000.

Just imagine, if you had been the lucky recipient of the firing glasses when new, might you have risked pouring a drop of fine claret into them, swiftly knocking it back and then smartly cracking the base on the table in a 'Fire'. I don't think I would, but it did get me thinking about firing glasses in general. What they were? How they came about? And the way we use them today?

Evidently, the tradition of 'Firing' with a glass is not Masonic, but, as you might expect from the term, an old military one, which is thought to have originated in the French regiments during the early 18th century, replacing a festive 'Fire' tradition in which firearms were discharged to celebrate special toasts, particularly after battle successes. There is an account of a dinner held in honour of the Prince Regent, George IV, where Grenadiers Guardsmen were lined up outside and made to fire a volley at the end of each toast, and it was not unknown, back in the day, for the Royal Navy to fire cannons in honour of a toast. So, with the strong connections, which have always existed between the armed forces and Freemasonry, it can be seen how easily this tradition may have been absorbed into the early days of Lodge meetings.

The glasses version of the 'Fire' was seemingly able to create a suitable level of celebratory noise for those taking part, and was a less expensive, and probably a safer alternative. However, I do wonder how many drinking glass stems were broken in the process of banging them on the table before someone designed the firing glass we know today.

Certainly, a 'Masonic Fire' is referenced in the Samuel Pritchard book 'Three Distinct Knocks' which was published in 1785 and based on one of the Masonic Exposures that were serialised in the 1723 London newspapers and detailed the ceremonies and after proceedings as practiced by the Antients.

Every Man has a Glaſs fet him, and a large Bowl of Punch, or what they like, is ſet in the Center of the Table; and the ſenior Deacon charges (as they call it) in the North and Eaſt, and the junior Deacon in the South and Welt; for it is their Duty fo to do, to fill all the Glaſſes. Then the Maſter takes up his Glaſs, and gives a Toaſt to the King and the Craſt, with Three Times Three in the Apprentice's and they all ſay Ditto, and drink all together, minding the Maſter's Motion.

My thoughts then moved onto my own firing glasses, in particular the one I received after having been Worshipful Master of Arrow Lodge for the 2006/07 Masonic season.

Valueless to anyone other than myself and my nearest and dearest, but nonetheless, still a significant memento of a thoroughly enjoyable period in my life, which was commemorated with this gift, presented to me at Arrow Lodge No 2240, on the night of the installation of my successor, by the other Masters who were on the circuit at the same time.

I'm not sure when this tradition started in our Province, but my enquiries so far have managed to confirm Masters receiving commemorative firing glasses as far back as the 1980s, but I would be interested to hear information from any of the Brethren of the Province who might be able to throw further light on the tradition of Past Masters receiving Firing Glasses.

Multiple Candidate Ceremonies

At the December Quarterly Communication of Grand Lodge, and following the launch last year of the Strategy for Freemasonry: 2022 and beyond - specifically supporting the pillar of Thriving Membership - it was announced that the MW Pro Grand Master had asked the Grand Director of Ceremonies to put together some guidance for Lodges in the form of a film, showing how an Initiation ceremony with several candidates could be undertaken.

The format of the film was to be a Lodge of Instruction – not a Lodge meeting – with the specific goals of demonstrating how such a ceremony would work, and of dispelling the myths that can be propagated about such ceremonies. Very little speech was to be involved, apart from an explanatory voiceover, and nothing "secret" was to be shown on camera.

As well as including the key set pieces of the ceremony of Initiation, the film contains an introduction by the MW Pro Grand Master, and an open discussion between RW Brother Neil Connolly, Provincial Grand Master for Hertfordshire, and Brethren who have been part of multiple candidate ceremonies, either as candidates or as Lodge Officers.

Please note that the film is not meant to be distributed to the general public.

In Herefordshire we have been fortunate enough to have a number of candidates recently. The link to the video is in the First Rising Special Edition sent out via email on the twelfth of March 2024 and is certainly worth watching.
