Would I know the answer?

Did I know the answer?

I asked: Lodge Numbers?

During the last few weeks, with a few moments to myself, (it does not happen very often now), I decided to dust my bookshelves. I rediscovered 'A History of Craft Freemasonry in Herefordshire 1727 -2000' by our own W Bro Alwyn Williams, once our Provincial Grand Secretary. I am sure that many of you have seen this copy, but it is always good to refresh oneself.

This led me to look at Lodge Numbers and it appears that the first Lodge in Herefordshire was in Hereford in 1727 meeting at the Swan and Falcon in Broad Street and numbered 167, later changed to 152 in 1742. It was never registered and closed in 1754. In Leominster a Lodge was formed in 1742. It was numbered 191 and later changed to 125 on 1755. This Lodge closed in

1768. It is also interesting to note that Lodges were not given names but were recognised only by number. The story continues but interestingly appears to be centred around Leominster since it had a nearness to Ludlow and transport and journeys were difficult. It was only when the railways arrived that Freemasonry could expand in this Province.

So, what of a few of the older Lodges in Herefordshire?

Palladian Lodge was issued with a Warrant in October 1762 and given the number 290. Over the years, as other Lodges were erased, the number was changed. In 1813 it became 196, in 1832 it was 141 and finally in 1863 Number 120, which remains today. The involvement in and for the Province is good reading and I recommend you to do so. The movement of meeting places is also interesting, until settling in Kyrle Street in 1929.


Vitruvian Lodge started as Number 254 and its Warrant date as 1812. Confusion at Grand Lodge, and the loss of documents resulted in an agreement to confirm it as 1821. At this stage its number became 637, then 644 and in 1832 to 423. Its present number 338 was agreed in 1863. The number of meeting places is extensive and worth looking into.

A petition from members of Vitruvian and Palladian, together with members from Monmouthshire was drawn up in 1858 and Eastnor Lodge was consecrated as Number 1053 and met at the Feathers Hotel! The Lodge received its present number 751 in 1863.

These are but a few of the Lodges in our Province and I hope that anyone interested in their own Lodge can follow W Bro Williams explanation by getting a copy of the book. I can assure you that it is very thorough and worthwhile.

If you have not visited the 'Solomon' site lately, you should. There are now Videos, Podcasts and Webinars available for more in depth explanations. Facebook and Twitter also offer links for more information.

Chris Neave Memorial Challenge Paddle - Cycle - Climb 17 - 23 Sep 2023



The Challenge

On the 22nd of September 2022 my younger brother passed away after a long battle with poor health. He spoke often about conducting adventures in Scotland if he was of good health.

To that end Carl D and I will attempt the first Caledonian Adventure Triathlon:

Paddle from Fort William, on the West Coast of Scotland, to Fort Augustus at the start of Loch Ness. This will take 2 days and cover 52km.

Cycle from Fort Augustus around Loch Ness via Inverness on the East Coast. This will take 2+ days and will cover 120km both on and off road.

Climb Ben Nevis which will take 1 day and climb over 1300m for a distance of 17km.

All of this will be conducted fully self supported with wild camping.

50% to **Herefordshire Masonic Charity Association (HMCA)**


