






Community Engagement

A Thank You From Royal National College For The Blind



Dear Tim & members of Herefordshire Masonic Charities Association,

On behalf of all staff and students at The Royal National College for the Blind (RNC), I would like to extend our sincere gratitude for your generous grant, which enabled us to upgrade our existing embossing machine to a more advanced model. As Braille and its teaching are integral to RNC, both staff and students have greatly benefited from this purchase.

Key Aims

The key objectives of acquiring the new embosser were:

- · To increase the capability of printing higher volumes of Braille documents more efficiently.
- To ensure the new model was fully accessible for visually impaired (VI) staff and students.
- To ensure software compatibility, including translation services for French, Spanish, and German.

Following extensive research, we selected a model that effectively addressed these concerns. Additionally, to mitigate noise during the embossing process, we installed the machine in a purpose-built cabinet that allows clear visibility while significantly reducing noise levels. Once the new Braille embosser was purchased and installed, key staff received training, which was subsequently rolled out to other staff and students.

Beneficiaries

RNC currently has 100 students, all of whom potentially benefit from using the embosser or the Braille materials it produces. The increased efficiency of the new embosser has resulted in significant time savings for users.

Additionally, students and VI staff can independently operate the new embosser, as the control panel instructions are in Braille. Apart from academic purposes, the embosser is used for:

- · Student timetables and meeting minutes.
- Language support in French, German, and Spanish, which are taught up to A-level. A volunteer in the French department utilises the embosser for conversation sessions.
- · Art projects, such as a recent study on Banksy.
- Choir materials, including vocabulary and lyrics for the College's Wellbeing Choir.

Impact

The embosser is housed in a dedicated small room within the main teaching corridor. Previously, the noise from the old embosser was disruptive, but the new model is significantly faster and quieter, making it more conducive to the learning environment.

There has also been a notable increase in the number of students wishing to learn Braille. Currently, 75% of students are either studying Braille or on a waiting list. By continuously improving technology and ensuring accessibility, we encourage student interest in Braille and help them gain familiarity with equipment they may encounter in the workplace - particularly those on our Business Studies courses.

The upgraded embosser has already had a transformative impact on our students and staff, providing enhanced accessibility, efficiency, and inclusivity. We are deeply grateful for your support, which has played a vital role in fostering a more inclusive and enriching learning environment at RNC.

We were so thrilled to hear the news about the donation you are making to @The Hub, that is so kind!

Herefordshire Freemasons Answering the Call from St Michael's Hospice.



2024 Event Support

During 2024, the Caeruleum Club provided an amazing level of support for events run by St Michael's Hospice. This included stewarding car parks and manning checkpoints for various events to ensure that the Hospice's fundraising ran smoothly, enabling the Hospice staff and volunteers to focus on the fundraising activities. In total they provided well over two hundred hours of community support at the various events.

Supporting the Digital Fundraising Campaign

In parallel, at the Herefordshire Masonic Charitable Association (HMCA) meeting in May 2024, W Bro David Knowles instigated the 'Call to Arms' for a Province-wide initiative to raise money for the Hospice's forty-hour digital fundraising campaign on 28th October. The Hospice had managed to get match funding and were looking to raise £400,000 to help fund the training and development of their nurses. To accomplish this, they wanted to receive as many pledges as possible before the start of the forty-hour digital campaign on 28th October.

Call to 'Alms'

Following the May HMCA Meeting, W Bro Tim Bridgland-Taylor, the Provincial Charity Steward, circulated a request to all the Lodge Charity Stewards asking for help in the form of pledges that were to be run through the usual proposition and voting process in Lodge meetings.

Lodges in the Province did not disappoint. They answered the call, and together with donations from Chapters, the Mark Province, and support from the HMCA and MCF, a total of £30,250 was raised, which would in turn be match funded by St Michael's corporate sponsors towards their overall target of £400,000.

Follow Up Visit.

On 12th February 2025, the Provincial Grand Master RW Bro Michael Holland, together with W Bro Tim Bridgland-Taylor, visited St Michael's Hospice to see the difference the £30,250 donation was making. They met with Matt Fellows, Chief Executive and Company Secretary, Rachel Jones, Income Generation, Marketing and Comms Director and Tony Larkin, Fund Raiser. They were able to discuss the impact the service provided by the Caeruleum Club and the donation had made. After tea they were provided with a tour of the Hereford facility except for the wards and en-route the Provincial Grand Master pointed out the plaque in memory of RW Bro David Bowen.

Investiture of the new Deputy Provincial Grand Master

March 2025 has been quite a month for VW Bro Graham King, Past Deputy Provincial Grand Master for Herefordshire and Past Most Excellent Grand Superintendent in and over the Royal Arch Province of Gloucestershire and Herefordshire. Not only did he hand over the Deputy Provincial Grand Master's Collar to W Bro J Stuart Jones, but he also celebrated forty years in the Royal Arch with a presentation at Filton Chapter of Fortitude No 6498, as can be seen in the picture below.



VW Bro Graham's Masonic CV extends over many pages and many different progressive orders. He is also currently Provincial Grand Master for Gloucestershire and Herefordshire in the Royal Order of Scotland.

His list of current memberships is very extensive with eleven current Lodge memberships and twenty two Chapters. The list of active offices is equally impressive, taking the MEZ's chair six times and WM's chair four times. Graham's progression through Provincial and Grand Ranks began in 1992 in the Craft as Past Provincial Grand Steward in Gloucestershire and in 1997 as Provincial Grand Sword Bearer in Gloucestershire and Herefordshire Royal Arch.

His first Grand Rank in the Craft was awarded in 2004 as Past Assistant Grand Director of Ceremonies and in 2003 in Royal Arch as Past Grand Standard Bearer.

We asked VW Bro Graham what the highlights have been over his long and illustrious career. He responded:

"I have had a think about particular highlights over the years and there are so many it is hard to pick out one in particular."

"The Annual Investiture of 2014 when the Grand Master invested me as Grand Sword Bearer, the day I was invested as Grand Superintendent in and over the Royal Arch Province of Gloucestershire and Herefordshire back in 2008, a post I was lucky enough to hold for ten years. And of course being invested as Deputy Provincial Grand Master for Herefordshire are three that stand out."

"In summary my thoughts are how thankful I am for the support and kindness of the Brethren and Companions of both Gloucestershire and Herefordshire."

"I trust that I honoured the commitments I made in every obligation that I have taken over 40+ years and served with humility, dedication and above all humanity."

"All I can hope is that history will judge me kindly, it's a shame I will be unable to write it."

I think it is fair to say that history will remember Graham very kindly and he will certainly be a very tough act for Stuart to follow.



Investing J Stuart Jones as Deputy Provincial Grand Master had particular meaning being at the Eastnor Lodge meeting in March. Not only was this Stuart's Lodge but also where RW Bro Michael Holland was Invested as Deputy Provincial Grand Master back in 2018.
