VE Day Celebrations



We supported the Royal British Legion at their VE day celebrations in Madley by marshalling the car park.

Also, as part of the VE 80 Commemorations, beacons were lit across the country. In Hereford, after a full day of commemorations including reading of the Peace Proclamation, wreath laying, participation in the Nation's 2 minutes silence and a cathedral service of thanksgiving, a beacon was lit on the traditional beacon

The meeting was opened in the Grand Temple and Most Worshipful Pro Grand Master Jonathan Spence was received followed by a series of presentations on the Strategy Pillars and a video on the Royal Arch.

Reflecting on a good year and looking forward to the next

The Deputy Provincial Grand Master looks back at our Membership Challenge successes over the last year and forwards to the next.



As our 2024/25 season draws to a close, we are in a strong position with membership up by 4%, meaning we now have 516 members. We have initiated over 41 new members, passed 24 and raised 11. Resignations are down versus the previous year which, we hope, is a reflection of members in Herefordshire enjoying their Freemasonry.

Hopefully we can encourage more sharing of the ritual and encourage newer members to take part in ceremonies. We can achieve this by asking them to take on smaller pieces of work such as working tools or charges, then this will increase participation and thereby enjoyment for all. We have seen most Lodges now adopt double ceremonies across all 3 degrees, to great success, meaning we are progressing people sooner so they can fully partake in our activities.

We do need to ensure that we work to maintain the standard of our ceremonial work, through supporting those who may have difficulty in learning, through LOI meetings and Lodge rehearsals, accepting individual limitations for whatever reason and providing support, through Past Masters sharing the work in particular helping those who may have work and family pressures that make learning ritual a challenge. And I would ask all

members to try their best to learn ritual but also not be afraid to ask for help when it gets too much.


As we start the new season you will learn more about the new "Building Together" Program that will look to create a single educational resource for all, by combining the Member's Pathway and Archway programs into one, strengthening the link between Craft and Royal Arch and ensuring that new candidates and existing members are aware of the four elements of Pure and Ancient Freemasonry.

We have 7 candidates awaiting initiation currently and, to help recruitment, we will hold our first Open Evening on 7th July in Kyle Street to which we already have around thirteen gentleman attending. We are also investigating running some local social media campaigns to help drive awareness and interest. This linked with our overall community engagement activities will help in finding new candidates and improve understanding of Freemasonry in Herefordshire.

So there is plenty to be proud of over the last year, but we need to remain focussed on building the future of our organisation and ensuring all members enjoy their Freemasonry.

I say hopefully because, of course, we still have members who require 'hard copy' since technology is not their thing.



What would our forefathers make of that?

Changes take place, and indeed must. But to get all of that information out to as many members as possible, and to carry them forward with us, is our next major problem. 



Growing the Chapter

Community Engagement



Supporting Herefordshire Veterans - Living up to the Armed Forces Covenant.

Herefordshire has a long history of supporting the Armed Services and in 2022 Herefordshire Province signed the Armed Forces Covenant showing the indissoluble link between Freemasonry and the Armed Services.

Forward by Colonel Andy Taylor

Colonel Andy Taylor is a member of Eastnor Lodge and the Honorary Curator of The Herefordshire Light Infantry Museum. He has been researching the Regiment for 40 years and his grandfather served in the Regiment during the First World War. His father served in the Herefordshire Regiment Home Guard in Ledbury in World War II and he was first Commissioned into the Herefordshire Light Infantry Cadet Battalion.



Historically, Herefordshire provided foot soldiers to the militia. In 1860, at the height of the Empire, existing troops were serving throughout the globe. There was a perceived French invasion threat to the United Kingdom and the Rifles Volunteer Corps was formed for home defence.

This was effectively the birth of the modern volunteer/part time soldier. Herefordshire formed a unit with detachments through the county and into Radnor. Men from the Herefordshire Rifle Volunteer Corps served in the Boer War in South Africa between 1899 and 1902.

A review of reserve forces saw the disbandment of the Rifle Volunteers and the formation of the Territorial Force in 1908 and the Herefordshire Regiment was formed. The Regiment was called up for wartime service in August 1914 and saw service in Gallipoli, the Middle East and the Western Front.

After the First World War, the Territorial Force was renamed as the Territorial Army and were again called up for War Service in September 1939 and landed over the beaches of Normandy six days after D-Day.

The period after World War II has seen constant reorganisation of the Forces; the Herefordshire Regiment was renamed the Herefordshire Light Infantry in 1946 and was disbanded in 1966 becoming two companies of the Light Infantry Volunteers and in 2007 the Light Infantry became part of the Rifles Regiment.

During the Second World War Herefordshire became a base for three airfields (Shobdon, Madley and Hereford (Credenhill)). Some Royal Navy personnel were also

based in the county and many Allied troops, especially Americans, were concentrated in the county in the build-up to D-Day.

Herefordshire has never had its own county regular regiment but the home of Special Forces is based here and many men and women from the county have served, and continue to serve, in all three branches of the services.

With this historical backdrop, and with many serving and veteran servicemen being members of Lodges throughout Herefordshire, it was particularly poignant that the Armed Services Covenant was signed in June 2022. The RW Provincial Grand Master, Michael T Holland, and

Col Andy Taylor, Deputy Lord Lieutenant, signed the Covenant in the Assembly Room of the Town Hall witnessed by a number of dignitaries.



Since then, Herefordshire Freemasons have provided support to many Veterans charities and provided support at Veterans events.

During 2024 we were able honour this commitment on a number of occasions.

In September we were able to answer an urgent appeal for help by the Provincial Grand Almoner from Suffolk, W Bro Jamie Gwatkin, who had developed a programme of Military Veterans Days across the UK in partnership with 'The Not Forgotten' charity. We managed to arrange at short notice Brethren to assist with car parking and distributing the food at a Veterans day in Allensmore. It was a sunny day with excellent entertainment and a very enjoyable day for all.



One Veteran provided this feedback at the end of the day:

“The day made me feel socially included, and I felt that I fitted in. Being a disabled Veteran with my injuries, it is very difficult to get out and about doing things that normal people do. After time, this does naturally chip away at the mental health and has [done so] personally for me. Before I discovered The Not Forgotten and attended your Drive-in, I was feeling very isolated, completely ignored, and frankly left to rot by the country I was injured in serving. I then came home from the Drive-in absolutely beaming with positivity and since that day my mental health and outlook on life has improved dramatically and I have not stopped talking about it since. I now feel strongly that my service to the Country was not all one-sided, and it is The Not Forgotten Team I have to thank, from the bottom of my heart.”

2024 was no exception and wreaths were laid on our behalf at a number of locations including Hereford, Ledbury, Kington and Ross on Wye.



The Not Forgotten Garden Party

What a great sunny day to share with over 2,000 veterans, service personnel and their guests at Buckingham Palace for their annual Not Forgotten Garden Party, by kind permission of His Majesty The King and graciously hosted by HRH The Duchess of Gloucester.

Guests from the Navy, Army, RAF and Merchant Navy, from across the UK and of all ages from their thirties to 106, gathered yesterday afternoon for an unforgettable experience on the lawns of the Palace, letting them know their service will always be valued and they will never be forgotten. A number of Masonic Provinces were represented, who had assisted at events for the charity.

We are looking forward to assisting with an event later in the year in Herefordshire for this worthwhile cause.



As part of the VE 80 Commemorations, beacons were lit across the country. In Hereford, after a full day of commemorations including reading of the Peace Proclamation, wreath laying, participation in the Nation’s two minutes silence and a Cathedral Service of thanksgiving, a beacon was lit on the traditional beacon site in Churchill Gardens on Aylestone Hill. The event was organized by Hereford City Council and the City Marshall asked for support from Herefordshire Masons. Simon Glover answered the call, clearing the area, preparing the beacon and handing the torch to the Mayor of Hereford, Councillor Kevin Tillet to light the beacon.



In November, Brethren from the Caeruleum Club assisted with distributing poppies to around one hundred businesses and schools around Hereford, delivering packs and collections tins for the Royal British Legion Poppy Appeal.



Eastnor Lodge went a step further by taking on responsibility for running the appeal locally in Ledbury. Over 60 boxes and tins were delivered around the town and outlying villages. Notices were sent to the another 30 groups wanting wreaths and deliveries were undertaken.

During the appeal, collection points were co-ordinated in superstores and the High Street, plus some training on using the card machines. Following the appeal the money was collected, counted and banked.

Each year Brethren attend a number of Remembrance Services across the Province to remember those who gave their lives in service of our country.

The launch of our 2031 Festival is just around the corner. We look at what a festival is and what to expect.

To raise money for the MCF, Provinces in England and Wales organise fundraising appeals known as festivals. Festival appeals usually last for five years and are a vital source of funding and generate the majority of donations made to the MCF. We are extremely grateful for the hard work and generosity of Freemasons who support their festival appeals.

Understanding the Festival System

A total of 44 of the 47 Provinces under UGLE take part in the festival system. Each Province typically holds a festival once every eleven years. Many Provinces elect to hold a festival appeal lasting between five and seven years; the Guidelines therefore follow this pattern meaning that the festival launch will occur between years four and six of the eleven year cycle.

The last festival held in Herefordshire was for 2020 but due to Covid this was extended to 2021. During that festival we raised the amazing total of £424,000.

What is a festival?

A festival is a fundraising appeal that is held to raise funds in support of the MCF. The festival consists of an 'appeal' and a 'finale'. During the appeal, members across the Province are encouraged to donate, raise funds, participate in events, learn about and promote the work of the charity and join together for the benefit of the Province, the members and the MCF. The result of the appeal is celebrated at a festival event when the total amount raised through donations is announced and the achievements and activities of the Province are celebrated.

A festival is very much a partnership with the MCF. Through the support given and the participation of the MCF in every aspect of the appeal and the festival, the MCF aim to work with the Province to deliver a successful outcome.

The importance of festival appeals

The MCF is often faced with the misconception that additional donations are not needed due to the income it receives from its investments and the Annual Contribution. In reality, around 60 per cent of our income comes from the contributions of today's Freemasons, the majority of which is raised through festival appeals.

In 2019/20 the MCF spent over £36.2m supporting beneficiaries and charities, whereas the income received from investments amounted to only £7.44m. This statistic clearly demonstrates that festivals are vital if the MCF is to continue its activities.

What next?

The Festival will be officially launched next year in 2026. We are currently in a planning phase to prepare for the launch. We have already set up the Relief Chest at MCF so it is possible to start making donations already. This is the QR code which will enable one off donations to be made although we will announce later how regular donations can be made as well as the Festival Target and other details.

It would be great to run a number of events at Provincial and Lodge level during the Festival period so get your thinking caps on so we can have a number of fun events as well as raising money for a great cause.

You can already make one off donations as the relevant 'Hereford 2031' accounts are set up with the MCF. A proportion of funds will now be kept in Province. Donations can be made using the QR code or by this link <https://gtap.uk/hereford2031>.
